Quotes & Notes

- Enough Talk shocked the field of Breeders Crown elimination trotters rolling out a lifetime best 1:51.1 mile under mild urging from driver Ron Pierce. The duo left sharply from the gate and yielded briefly to Digital Image and Rick Zeron before stepping sharply around them to resume control of the race just past the half in :56.1. From that point Enough Talk accelerated sharply, drawing away by five and three quarter lengths at the wire.
- "He scored down real hot. He was just laying on me and didn't want to let go. He pulled all the blood out of my arms," said Pierce. "I wound up taking him to the girl [outrider] just to get the blood back in my arms. She settled him down real nice, then he went to the gate and he was all business after that.
- Enough Talk returned from a Scandinavian tour at the end of June. The altered son of Enjoy Lavec was second in the elimination and third in the Elitlopp final [driven by WEG driving star Luc Ouellette] and second in the Copenhagen Cup.
- He lowered his lifetime mark by more than a full second in setting a new Mohawk track record that also equaled the Canadian record set by Mr. Muscleman and tied the fastest Breeders Crown mile ever, set by Varenne in 2001.
- The win allowed co-owner and trainer Pete Kleinhans to pick his post position for the US\$600,00 Breeders Crown final next week. Kleinhans chose post four.

- “I just let Ron Pierce do what ever he thinks is right on the horse, I thought he would be as good as he was last start, which was a great effort,” beamed Kleinhans. “We put aluminum shoes on him before his last start and I think that bumped him up a couple of extra lengths and just enough to move him up to the head of the class. I hope he stays there!”
- “My assistant Rick Durden trained him a mile in 1:58 last week at Gaitway Farm and came back and interval trained him, which we do with some of our horses on Tuesday and that was basically it. We shipped to Vernon on Wednesday and up to here (Mohawk) on Thursday and just jogged yesterday (Friday). “I didn’t know what the track record was and I wasn’t thinking about it. I thought he raced well, but I didn’t expect a track record effort. “He is just going to jog this week and that is it.”
- “This horse is just so versatile, nothing fazes him. He has been in everywhere. He has been shipped all over Sweden and Denmark, and had no problems with the ship. He is just so versatile; I think he’s been in seven different stalls in five days. You can do anything that you want with him; he seems to handle everything so easily. He just seems as if nothing fazes him. I think he will be fine.
- When asked about his training methods, Kleinhans prefers not to settle for any one way of doing things. “I believe in a number of different training methods. I read an article once (on human conditioning, but I believe it is the same for equine) that there are four different types of conditioning. Sprints, some pretty fast but not that long, some pretty long but not that fast, and some very long and slow. I try to employ all of these methods when I have the opportunity. It does not always work when they are racing every week. It might just be too much to ask for all of these different things.
- Kleinhans bought Enough Talk in March of this year after watching him race as a three-year-old. “I’ve always admired this horse and thought he was special,” Kleinhans noted. “His previous owner, Matthew Butcher Jr., is a great trainer and blacksmith. He didn’t race him as a 2-year-old and he brought him along slowly. He drove him conservatively and his goal was to showcase him and sell him eventually. I watched every single replay of his and he basically had only one poor performance in his life. Every race he was going forward. I’m a huge fan of Enjoy Lavec as a sire and there aren’t anymore here.”

- Enough Talk also lowered the world record for an older trotting gelding on a 5/8-mile track in the \$85,000 Classic Series at Dover to 1:52.2. He has had eight different drivers this year.
- Kleinhans also starts Lavec Dream in the Mare Trot.
- If ever there was a renaissance man in harness racing, it is Kleinhans. The 42-year-old trainer splits his time between an apartment overlooking Central Park in New York City and a 230-acre farm in Flemington, New Jersey. He has an M.A. in English Literature from New York University and Juris Doctor from the University of Michigan Law School. While racing horses off and on for more than 20 years, he has also worked as a track announcer and racing analyst at The Meadows, Hoosier Park, The Red Mile and Tioga Downs, and even called a race at Solvalla while racing Enough Talk in the Elitlopp. He is also a professor at John Jay College of Criminal Justice in New York City. In his spare time, Kleinhans has developed a pilot for a television show on handicapping and is fine-tuning a book and computer program on the subject. Kleinhans is part of the ownership of Tioga and Vernon Downs racetracks in New York State. And he is also a devoted father to his 3-year-old son, Quinn.
